






1. [Pied Piper]. Verstegan, Richard. A Restitution of Decayed Intelligence: In Antiquities Concerning the Most Noble and Renowned English Nation. Antwerp: Bruney, 1605.

First Edition. First appearance of the Pied Piper of Hamelin [Pyed Pyper] in English. Curious volume also mentions Shakespeare and werewolves. Very good in early reverse-calf paneled in blind, label in gilt to spine, boards expertly reattached, light chipping to spine. Title with two closed tears near gutter, early ink to title and early notes to margins, mild and consistent age-tone, a few instances of light foxing. [24], 338, [14] pp., includes numerous engraved vignettes in-text and one plate of coat-of-arms (also included in pagination.). Considered to be "a seminal work of Anglo-Saxon scholarship" (ODNB) and the best edition for the quality and number of its engravings. With the armorial bookplate of Dorothy Peck Luckie. \$1,000






2. W.S. Esq. [Sheppard, William]. The Parsons Guide: or the Law of Tithes; Wherein is shewed, who must pay tythes, and to whom, and of what things, when, and how they must be paid, and how they may be recovered at this day, and how a man may be discharged of payment thereof. London: Printed by T.M. for W. Lee, etc., 1654.


First edition of Sheppard's work supporting Cromwell's financial demands. In 1653, Sheppard was invited to London by Cromwell, and made one of the clerks of the upper bench, the next year he wrote this work. Bound in modern marbled boards. Very good. \$300

# 3. Lesley, Charles [Leslie, Charles]. **Mr. Lesley to the Lord Bishop of Serum**. 1715.

Scarce pamphlet <u>signed</u> by Leslie at the conclusion. Leslie was the leading Jacobite propagandist after the 1688 Glorious Revolution and is best remembered today for his role in publicizing the 1692 Massacre of Glencoe. Very good, bound in 19th century half leather with loss to the spine. \$350








4. Companion to the Play-House: Or, An Historical Account Of All The Dramatic Writers (And Their Works) That Have Appeared In Great Britain And Ireland, From The Commencement Of Our Theatrical Exhibitions, Down To The Present Year 1764. London: T. Becket and P.A. Dehondt, 1764.

First Edition. Two volumes. Contemporary full calf that is bumped and chipped, grubby, and a bit dry. Damp staining and top of volume 2 title page clipped. Association copy with the ownership inscription of John Reeve, a notable actor during the middle of the 19th century, dated "Haymarket 1830", which were among his last performances at the Haymarket Theatre. Overall a good plus set. \$250



6. Clark, Mary. **Biographical Sketches of the Fathers of New England**. Concord: Marsh, Capen & Lyon, 1836.

First Edition. No copies at auction in over a century (RBH). Green pebbled cloth, gilt lettering on spine, soiling to covers, foxing to pages, hinges loose and some loss at spine. Good. \$200


7. Coggeshall, William T. Oakshaw or the Victims of Avarice; A Tale of Intrigue. Cincinatti: U.P. James, 1855.


First edition by Abraham Lincoln's self-appointed bodyguard. No copies have appeared at auction since 1954 (RBH). Good in publisher's green blind stamped boards with some bumping/staining and pages foxed throughout with portion of rfep torn. Wright v2 596. \$250

5. Beasley, Samuel; [Townley, James] Garrick, David. **Is He Jealous?** [bound with] **High Life Below Stairs**. New York: Published by Charles Wiley; Philadelphia: H.C. Carey & I. Lea and M'Carty & Davis; Boston: Saml. H. Parker, [New York], 1824.

Two plays bound together. Marbled type soft wraps. Very good. \$95











9. Pugin, Augustus Welby Northmore. **Designs for Gold & Silversmiths**. London: Ackerman & Co., 1836.

First Edition of Pugin's text-free collection of gold and silver designs. 27 plates with tissue paper covering. About very good in publisher's cloth with paper cover label. While all copies we have seen of this book contain some red stamping, this copy contains additional hand-painted red accents. Some foxing, chipping to boards and minor spine tear. This collection has been referred to as "superb pen draughtsmanship" that Pugin had developed over the years 1833-1835, when he was producing his ideal schemes. Belcher A4.1. \$150



First book edition (previously published in two parts in the Dublin Review). A good plus copy in original publisher's blind stamped boards with some bumping, contents generally clean but fairly cocked. Bound with Dolman's 1840 catalogue of scarce theological works, Dolman's 1841 catalogue of scarce theological works, and English Catholic. Belcher A28.3. \$225








11. Pugin, Augustus Welby Northmore. **An Earnest Address on the Establishment of the Hierarchy**. London: Charles Dolman, 1851.

First edition of Pugin's pamphlet wherein he again attempted to venture into theological matters creating quite a controversy, and one of the last works he wrote prior to his death in 1852. Very good pamphlet without wrappers as issued. Belcher A56. \$225



First Edition. Nicely bound in modern marbled paper boards. Includes fold out sketch of the church. Very good. \$180



13. Bulfinch, Thomas. **The Age of Chivalry**. Boston: Crosby, Nichols, and Company, 1859.

First Edition. Presentation copy, <u>inscribed</u> in ink on the original endpaper to "Rev. Charles Hammond, / with the respects of / T. Bulfinch." Below that in ink is written twice, apparently by Hammond's son, "Charlie A. Hammond." Peter Parley to Penrod, pages 14-15 (state A). 414, [2] pp. with Frontispiece and five plates. Original blind-stamped cloth with gilt spine (recased, with new endpapers and fly-leaves; original front endpaper bound in). Good plus. \$325




15. Blanchard, Laman, ed. **George Cruikshank's Omnibus**. London: Tilt and Bogue, 1841.


First Edition in book form. <u>Inscribed</u> on the boundin pictorial wrapper by <u>Cruikshank</u>. Originally published in 9 monthly installments, with original wrapper from Part 1 bound in. vi, [2], 300 pp. 22 steel engraved plates, 78 wood-engravings in text. Original blind stamped green cloth, gilt vignettes and titles on front and spine. Very good with shelfwear, foxing, and some bumping in a modern slipcase. \$400



14. Barrie, J.M.; Hole, William, illustrator. **A Window in Thrums**. London: Hodder and Stoughton, 1892.

First illustrated edition. <u>Signed</u> by both Barrie and the illustrator at the limitation statement. No. 11 of 50 special copies from a total edition of 560. Illustrated with 18 etchings by William Hole. Original blue cloth, spine lettered in gilt. xiv, 217 pp. Very good with light wear and hinges cracked. \$600



16. McIntire, Carl. **The Rise of the Tyrant; Controlled Economy vs. Private Enterprise**. Collingswood, New Jersey: Christian Beacon Press, 1945.

First Edition. <u>Inscribed</u> by the author on the ffep. A curious work laying out the Biblical basis for market economies post-WWII. Very good in fair dust jacket. \$90

17. Kipling, Rudyard. **The Five Nations**. London: Methuen & Co., 1903.

First Edition. <u>Signed</u> by Kipling on the title page. Red cloth boards; spine lettering and top edge gilt; with 38 pages of ads at rear, and David misprint, as called for. Very good with spine ends worn, corners rubbed, some foxing, and spine and portion of boards faded. \$250

19. Frost, Robert; woodcuts by J.J. Lankes. **New Hampshire**. New York: Henry Holt & Company, 1932.


First Trade Edition. <u>Signed and inscribed</u> by Frost on the ffep. One of Frost's most notable books and winner of his first Pulitzer Prize. Wear to the edges and damp staining to the bottom portion of the spine and covers, with contemporary ownership inscription. Very Good, lacking the scarce dustjacket. \$850


20. Stein, Gertrude. Lady Church Amiably. Paris: Imprimerie "Union", 1930.

First Edition. <u>Signed</u> by Stein on the front endpaper. About very good original blue paper boards, printed in black with wear to boards and hinges started, in the poor but very scarce dust jacket. One of 1000 copies printed. Wilson A14. \$900

18. Chesterton, G.K. **The Ballad of the White Horse**. London: Methuen & Co., 1929.


<u>Signed</u> by Chesterton and the illustrator. Limited edition, number 89 of 100 copies. Very good original cloth backed boards, a bit browned and bumped at corners, paper spine label, a bit worn with some loss. \$375

First Edition. <u>Signed</u> and dated in the year of publication by Stein on the front endpaper. Very good with slight wear to extremities in a poor dustjacket with loss and separation. \$400

First Edition. <u>Signed</u> by Sagan on the title page. Near fine in Near fine dust jacket. \$275








25. Auden, W.H. **Homage to Clio**. London: Faber and Faber, 1960.

23. Vonnegut, Kurt. **Timequake**. New York: G.P. Putnam's Sons, 1997.



Gift Edition. <u>Signed</u> by Crichton on ffep. Very good in a very good clear wrapper with some scratches. \$90


27. Agee, James. Letters of James Agee to Father Flye. New York: George Braziller, 1962.

First Edition. <u>Inscribed and Signed</u> by Father Flye on the half title and title pages. Ex-library with usual treatments, some student graffiti to the cover, and library mylar, otherwise good. \$195

First Edition. <u>Signed</u> by Hitchens on title page. Very good in a very good dustjacket with some shelfwear. \$350




28. Cheever, John. **The Uncollected Stories of John Cheever 1930-1981**. Chicago: Academy Chicago Publishers, 1988.

Advance Reading Copy. Uncorrected Proof (not just the excerpt). 534 pp. Scarce <u>full</u> uncorrected proof which was suppressed prior to publication due to a legal dispute with Cheever's estate. Near fine blue wraps that are slightly faded. \$550

29. Sinclair, Upton. The Jungle. With illustrations by Fletcher Martin and a new preface by the author. Baltimore, MD: Garamond Press for the Limited Editions Club, 1965.

First thus. <u>Signed</u> by Sinclair and Martin on the limitation colophon. First edition with the Martin illustrations. 1/1500 copies (this copy being #110). Near fine quarter leather in very good publisher's slipcase which is partly faded with printed paper spine label. \$150
